Environmental Health Services

APPLICANT: Environmental Health (EH) Department

BACKGROUND:

Environmental Health Department fees cover a wide variety of services. While some services do not provide a mechanism for cost recovery, most activities do allow for cost recovery.

Some EH fees are firmly set in statute and others enable counties to set their own fees but cost recovery guidelines define this process. During the 2020 legislative session, some statutory fee caps were eliminated for the OWTS program allowing local agencies to get full cost recovery for these services. Those changes are the trigger for this fee amendment review and proposal.

For the 2021 budget, Environmental Health total operating expenses are \$605,617. Fifty-five percent (55%) of expenses are recovered through fees, contracts and grants. Forty-five percent (45%) of expenses are supported through the general fund.

The purpose of this Public Hearing is to discuss proposed fee amendment and then adopt proposed fees or discuss changes needed prior to adoption.

CRITERIA FOR DECISION:

- 1. The revisions must be consistent with applicable State statutes and CDPHE regulations.
- 2. The revisions will allow for better cost recovery in the Environmental Health programs.

Statutory Authority and Guidelines

Several statutes govern cost recovery for Environmental Health services including §25-1-508(5)(j), §25-10-107(1), §25-10-109 and §25-4-1607. In nearly all cases fees can only cover, the actual costs associated with providing the service.

PROCESS and STAFF COMMENTS:

The process started by reviewing the department hourly billable rate so all other department fees were also reviewed. We then compared the results with other departments and sought stakeholder input:

- 1. Review hourly billable rate.
- 2. Review all 34 individual fees.
- 3. Compare to other counties, departments and private business (if applicable).
- 4. Present to stakeholders and listen.
- 5. Present to Board of Health for consideration.

In nearly all cases a fee increase was justified with a couple exceptions. Fees are proposed to increase from a low of 0% to a high of 750% but are typically in the 30-50% range. These changes are expected to decrease the general fund contribution to the department enabling nearly \$74,000 to be redirected toward other services that do not have a mechanism for cost recovery such as complaint investigation and disease control work.

Stakeholder Input:

The information regarding proposed fee changes has been posted to the EH webpage and feedback is requested via email. Public noticing for this hearing was done in the Summit County Journal.

Staff have actively solicited stakeholder input. Emails have been sent to OWTS professionals, realtors, special event coordinators and temp food vendors sharing the information and asking for feedback totaling over 1000 persons invited. Invites were sent initially and then a few hours prior to the meeting. Stakeholder meetings occurred as follows:

- Special Event Coordinators via Zoom, 5/11/21,
- All stakeholders via Zoom, 5/17/21, and
- All stakeholders in person, 6/8/21.

Staff have encouraged all feedback in favor of changes and opposed.

The following feedback was received during these meetings or through other engagements:

5/11/21 SPECIAL EVENTS COORDINATORS MEETING- ZOOM

Attendees: About 12 local events coordinators.

Some good feedback here. Group was unanimously supporting the late fee adjustment to \$75. Highly recommend a reinspection fee for vendors. This suggestion was acted on and there is now a fee proposed for reinspections. They questioned why we wouldn't increase the vendor fees. I said because my calculations show we are already covering our costs.

5/17/2021 STAKEHOLDERS MEETING- ZOOM

Attendees: Robert Starekow (restaurant owner); Tina Cunningham (special events); Jeff Moore (realtor); Leanna Kerr (Coldwell Banker); Mark Kimball (Keystone F&B); Brian McCloughlin (realtor); Ryan Henderson (?); Luiza (septic systems PE); Ken Nelson (restaurant owner)

Robert S.-EH has a great image, especially with handling of pandemic. Seems like bad timing for raising fees when you consider many businesses are down in revenues and struggling. Would like to see the county hold off until business is back on track. Dan clarified that RF license fees are not changing. Does it make change to increase some

fees but not others? Would that change your perspective?

Robert S.- not really, shouldn't pick good vs bad partners. Still would like to see revenues back where they were pre-COVID. Local Govt. is getting money for COVID Relief.

Mark Kimball-from personal stand point he leans toward what Bobby said. Maybe wait a year? We don't know how economy will come back. Lots of staffing issues will hold back the come back and operating at full staff.

Automatic Annual Fee Increase:

On May 22, 2007, in conjunction with the major amendment to the development code, the BOCC discussed the idea of allowing the development review fees to be increased automatically each year by an amount equal to the percent increase in the consumer price index (CPI). Such an automatic increase is proposed for this fee schedule.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff respectfully recommends adoption of the amended EH fee schedule as proposed in Exhibit A.

Fees are to be effective starting July 1, 2021, as applicable and shall adjust annually per the Denver-Boulder CPI index for the previous year, rounding down to nearest dollar. Annual CPI increases do not prevent the Board of Health from making periodic fee adjustments as needed and permitted by law.

*CRS previously capped OWTS permit fees to \$1000 (permit fee + combination fee). In 2020 this cap was removed and now full cost recovery is allowed.
